Northampton Resident, William Tennent: His Life & the Log College Monday, September 16, 6:00 pm

Wendy Wirsch, President of the William Tennent House Association, will present this program in costume as Mrs. Catherine Kennedy Tennent, William's wife, as she discusses his life and the Log College.

A resident of Northampton Township and, later of Warminster, in 1727 Tennent established a religious school in a log cabin that became famous as the Log College. The educational influence of the Log College was of importance as many of its graduates went on to found schools along the expanding frontier. Princeton University is regarded as the successor to the Log College.

Mental Health Crisis Training Monday, September 23, 6:00 pm

"Question, Persuade, Refer"

Question, Persuade, Refer (QPR): Suicide Prevention Training will be presented by the Bucks County Suicide Prevention Task Force.

Attending the free, two-hour long training helps individuals understand and recognize when others are going through a mental health crisis. QPR teaches how to recognize clues, warning signs and suicidal communications of someone who may be in trouble.

The Way of Peace & The Iroquois Confederacy Monday, November 4, 6:00 pm

You are invited to join us as Christine Applegate of the Museum of Indian Culture discusses the Iroquois Confederacy, The Peacemaker and the Great Law of Peace as we celebrate Native American Heritage Month.

The Iroquois Confederacy, also known as the League of Peace and Power, was founded hundred of years ago. While some Western scholars date its formation to about 500 years ago, the Iroquois and many non-Native scholars date its creation to 1142, when a total solar eclipse occurred in the region. The Confederacy initially consisted of five tribes: the Mohawk, Oneida, Onondaga, Cayuga and Seneca, which were known as the Five Nations. A sixth nation, the Tuscarora, was added in 1722.


The Peacemaker, who brought The Great Law of Peace, united these warring nations to form the Haudenosaunee (the People of the Longhouse). This representative form of government not only inspired the U.S. Constitution, but continues to be relevant today.

Bucks County's Unique Habitats Monday, November 18, 6:00 pm

The Heritage Conservancy returns to the library once again this year to speak about the county's unique habitats, such as the Quakertown Swamp. The swamp is a 518-acre wetland with a diverse habitat that includes open water, shrub wetland, cattail marsh, wet meadow and forested swamp. It has been designated by the Audubon Society as an Important Bird Area and provides habitat for 91 bird species.

Mistress of the Art of Death

A medieval murder mystery! This is a wonderful book that pulls you into 12th century England. I love historical fiction novels because while the story is interesting, I also learn something about how life was in other time periods.

Adelia, a female forensics expert, which is almost unheard of at this time in history, is sent to investigate the brutal murders of several children. She must be careful and secretive in this time of prejudices against women and science.

This story involves Christians, Jews & Muslims and how people were treated during that time period. Adelia overcomes the ignorance and superstitions of the time cracking a case of unthinkable evil. With the possible murder suspect list getting longer and longer, it is hard to know who to trust.

Note: If you are of a sensitive nature, you may not want to read this book. Although descriptions are brief, they are graphic. Mostly, the book focuses on trying to solve this murder mystery.


This year, the TRANSFORMERS franchise teams up with the American Library Association to promote the value of a library card.
