PA Forward® Programs

Bucks County's Unique Habitats Monday, November 18, 6:00 pm

The Heritage Conservancy returns to the library once again this year to speak about the county's unique habitats, such as the Quakertown Swamp; a 518-acre wetland with a diverse habitat that includes open water, shrub wetland, cattail marsh, wet meadow and forested swamp, and has been designated by the Audubon Society as an Important Bird Area providing a habitat for 91 bird species.

Presenter, Tyler Kovacs, a Senior Conservation Biologist with the Heritage Conservancy, conducts conservation projects on the Conservancy's preserved land to help restore ecosystem health, benefiting both wildlife and our community. His previous experience includes conducting ecological restoration projects and studying wetlands, reforestation, and wildlife conservation in multiple countries. Tyler holds a B.S. from Shippensburg University and an M.S. from James Madison University in Biology.

Your Children Don't Want It: What Can You Do? 15 Tips! Saturday, December 7, 1:00 pm

At the Pennsylvania Library Association's annual conference in Harrisburg on October 8, Free Library of Northampton Township received an award for its PA Forward® *Information Literacy* program on *Scams and Fraud* which was presented by Officer Patrick Jainnini of the Northampton Township Police Department. The program, which was presented twice to the community this year, provided information on different scams and fraud scenarios and advice on how patrons could protect themselves.

Since 2017, when the Pennsylvania Library Association's PA Forward® initiative launched its *PA Forward*® *Star Library Program*, our library has continued to maintain Gold Star status through our diverse adult programming which continues to incorporate the five Literacies: Basic, Civic and Social, Information, Financial, and Health. To earn Gold Star status, Pennsylvania libraries are required to submit documentation of their efforts which is reviewed and verified by a committee of peer librarians. Those steps demonstrate that the library has incorporated the five key literacies into their programming and communication.



Forgotten Girls: A memoir of friendship and lost promise in rural America

When journalist, Monica Potts, came across the devastating statistic that the life expectancy of the least-educated white Americans showed the longest and most sustained decline in 100 years due to ailments coined "deaths of despair" (drug overdoses, suicides and complications from alcoholism) by Princeton economists, she was inspired to investigate how she escaped her small, poor town in Clinton, Arkansas while others couldn't.

In The Forgotten Girls, Potts rekindles her friendship with her childhood best friend, Darci, to find out how their lives were once so similar and how they ended up so different. She also sheds light on the factors that seemed to be contributing to the deaths of poor, rural white women all over America at staggering rates: addiction, sexism, and evangelicalism.

A beautiful memoir about a woman trying to reconcile her past and present by discovering how she came to take one path leading to success and stability - and how her friend took another - to poverty and desperation.

Marmee by Sarah Miller



A 2022 historical fiction novel based on Louisa May Alcott's *Little Women* through the perspective of their beloved mother Marmee. The book is written like a diary, with entries beginning in 1861 through to 1868, depicting the highs and lows of the March household during the Civil War.

I enjoyed seeing the story through Marmee's eyes and the detail Miller shares draws you into the text. Be warned there may be tears. The author also provides an explanation of how she developed the characters based on the Alcott's biography.

Readers will enjoy this novel if they love strong female characters, an ensemble of characters, the book *Little Women* and author Louisa May Alcott.

Northampton Township Archives

Have you walked by the Township Archives lately while visiting the library? The exhibit *Now & Then: The Northampton Township Police* will be ending as the year comes to a close. Staff are very grateful for the Northampton Township Police Department and the William Raymond "Ray" Shaw family for the opportunity to display these items that are a part of our community's history.

In early 2025, the Archives will have a new exhibit entitled: A Local Veteran & World War II: William Raymond Shaw's Collection, which will showcase Mr. Shaw's items from his military service.

The Archives continues to work in improving the collection's accessibility to the public online and have completed several oral history interviews with long-time residents, recording their experiences living in Northampton. The Archives continues to grow and 23 collections were added in 2024.

This year, we received a painting by local artist Anita Gronendahl, local newsletters, Council Rock school memorabilia, World War II artifacts, silent & not-so-silent films from early 20th century Northampton, oral histories, and local history ephemera.

History to Remember: Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day



On August 23, 1994, the United States Congress designated December 7 as National Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day. Each year on December 7, Pearl Harbor survivors, veterans, and visitors from all over the world come together to honor and remember the 2,403 service members and civilians who were killed during the

Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941. A further 1,178 people were injured in the attack, which permanently sank two U.S. Navy battleships (the USS Arizona and the USS Utah) and destroyed 188 aircraft. The attack on Pearl Harbor marked a pivotal moment in history, awakening America to a new reality of hardship and the specter of protracted war. The American people, both on the battlefields and the home front, rose to this challenge with resilience and determination.

Participating in the observance of National Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day allows individuals to honor the memory of the events of December 7,1941, and the sacrifices made during World War II. Here are ways to commemorate this day:

Attend Commemorative Events: Many communities and military bases hold memorial ceremonies and events on December 7th. Attend these events to pay your respects and show support.

Visit Memorials and Museums: Explore local memorials, museums, and historical sites related to World War II and the Pearl Harbor attack. Learn about the history and impact of the events.

Observe a Moment of Silence: At 7:55 a.m. (the time of the attack), observe a moment of silence to honor the victims and reflect on the significance of the day.

Support Veterans: Donate to veterans' organizations or volunteer your time to support veterans and their families. Many veterans from World War II are still alive and appreciate recognition and assistance.

Learn and Educate: Study the history of World War II and the events leading up to the attack on Pearl Harbor. Share this knowledge with younger generations to ensure the memory lives on.
