

smartphone or tablet, smart TV, or streaming device, or just watch movies from your computer!


Kanopy offers a Race & Class Studies collection that includes feature films and documentaries for you to explore during Black History Month, or any time.





Staff Pick ~ February

All That She Carried: The
Journey of Ashley's Sack,
a Black Keepsake
by Tiya Miles



National Book Award Winner and historian Tiya Miles has written a nonfiction book about a rare heirloom passed down from generations of women. The sack was given to nine-year-old Ashley by her mother Rose at the time of their separation at a slave sale in the 1800s. The love was passed down from mother to daughter and the story recorded in the sack's embroidery and oral tradition. The story was recorded by Rose's great-granddaughter and is now owned by Middle Place, a historic plantation near Charleston, South Carolina.

The story itself is so amazing that a cloth sack survived generations of wear and tear, but Miles' research and presentation of historical records brings out the story so much further. If you enjoy this book, you may also enjoy Laurel Thatcher Ulrich's A Mid-wife's Tales The Life of Martha Ballard, Based on Her Diary, 1785-1812.

February 11 ~ Nowhere Special

Runtime 96 minutes

Not Rated

John, a 35-year-old window cleaner, has dedicated his life to bringing up his 4-year-old son, Michael, after the child's mother left them soon after giving birth. When John is given only a few months left to live, he attempts to find a new, perfect family for Michael, determined to shield him from the terrible reality of the situation. As he struggles to find the right answer for the impossible task, he meets a social worker who opens him up to solutions he never would have considered. Focusing on the ordinary human moments that bind us, Nowhere Special leads us somewhere devastating yet surprisingly uplifting.



February 25 ~ Hard Miles

Runtime 108 minutes

Rated PG13 for thematic content, some teen drinking, suggestive references and strong language.

Hard Miles tells the uplifting true story of the bicycling team at Rite of Passage's Ridge View Academy, a medium-security correctional school in Colorado. The film follows beleaguered coach Greg Townsend as he rounds up an unlikely crew of incarcerated students for a seemingly impossible bike ride from Denver to the Grand Canyon. The bicycle serves not just as a means of transportation, but as a test; a way for each of these

young men to see what they are truly capable of, physically, mentally, and emotionally.



March 11 ~ The Ouiet Girl

Runtime 95 minutes

Rated PG13 for some strong language and smoking.

Rural Ireland. 1981. Nine-year-old Cait is sent away from her overcrowded, dysfunctional family to live with foster parents for the summer. Quietly struggling at school and at home, she has learned to hide in plain sight from those around her. She blossoms in their care, but in this house where there are meant to be no secrets, she discovers one painful truth. A remarkable debut for writer-director Colm Bairéad, The Quiet Girl

offers a deceptively simple reminder that the smallest stories can leave a large emotional impact.



March 25 ~ The Ministry of Ungentlemanly Warfare

Runtime 120 minutes

Rated R for strong violence throughout and some language.

Based upon recently declassified files of the British War Department and inspired by true events, The Ministry of Ungentlemanly Warfare is an actioncomedy that tells the story of the first-ever special forces organization formed during WWII by UK Prime Minister Winston Churchill and a small group of military officials including author lan Fleming. The top-secret combat unit, composed of a motley crew of rogues and mavericks, goes on a daring mission against the Nazis using entirely unconventional and utterly "ungentlemanly" fighting

techniques. Ultimately their audacious approach changed the course of the war and laid the foundation for the British SAS and modern Black Ops warfare

Did you watch Josh Gates' *Expedition Unknown* episode on the Doan Gang? You may have seen the Mercer Museum and the Pennsylvania Historical Recovery Services highlighted. Jim Bongiovanni of PHRS will discuss what they do, and share stories of the artifacts that he and his colleagues have recovered, adventures they have had, and the sites from which artifacts have been recovered dating back into the late 1600s. Artifacts will be on display for you to view as well as a Q&A after the presentation.

All artifacts that PHRS recovers are documented and turned over to the property owner or historical society.
